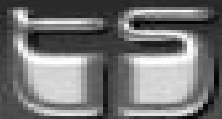

Middlemarch is the prime example of George Eliot's dictum that interpretations are illimitable and in this collection of new essays Middlemarch is re-examined as an open text responsive to gaps and fissures and as resistant to authority as it is to other fixed notions of identity idealism and gender What does the novel omit and how do the omissions shape what is there How shall we understand the materiality of the text What problems does it pose to adaptation The novel's plasticity becomes a basis for investigation into the multiple forms of expressiveness and a consideration of how we might plot the patterns linguistically ideologically even cinematically New spaces emerge within character place and narrative what seemed absent or inaccessible assumes shape and definition Middlemarch remains Victorian but it is a Victorianism understood through the dual perspectives of the 19th and 21st centuries Scholars of George Eliot and students of Victorianism will be engaged by the wide ranging scope of these essays which nonetheless build on each other to form a coherent narrative of critical reflections If there is something for everyone in Middlemarch there is also something compelling about each of the essays in this collection *George Eliot, Middlemarch* Catherine Neale, 1989 *Ma(r)king the Text* Joe Bray, Miriam Handley, Anne C. Henry, 2018-12-20 First published in 2000 this volume is a unique collection of essays which draws our attention to the importance of those textual elements traditionally ignored in literary criticism These include punctuation footnotes epigraphs typography cover design white space and marginalia features which significantly affect the meaning of a literary text The first section of the book opens with a proposal for a new theory of punctuation The essays which follow are devoted to detailed interpretations of particular marks in the work of individual writers including Spenser Richardson and George Eliot The consequences of this approach to the literary text are examined in the second section of the book which begins with a debate on editorial practice and responsibility and features insights from editors Attention is drawn in particular to the special issues thrown up by dramatic texts translations and electronic editions The relationship of marks to the main text is far from subordinate and we cannot appreciate the full interpretative potential of a text without considering this The essays here compel us to assess the interaction of textual and literary meaning To mark a text is to make it *Middlemarch (texte Entier)* George Eliot, 2018-12-28 Cette étude de la vie de province se déroule dans les années 1830 autour de quatre femmes

The Oxford Handbook of George Eliot , 2025-02-20 George Eliot repeatedly stressed the aesthetic and ethical importance of viewing subjects from different perspectives The Oxford Handbook of George Eliot presents fifty two perspectives on this major nineteenth century writer Together the chapters provide the most wide ranging collection of essays on Eliot s life and works published to date While providing fresh perspectives on the important themes running through Eliot s works the volume is distinctive in placing a concern with literary form at its heart Part I questions longstanding conceptions of Eliot as a figure isolated by scandal by exploring her personal and intellectual relationships with her contemporaries Part II focuses on Eliot s close engagement with earlier poets dramatists and novelists as well as with painting sculpture and music and in so doing probes Eliot s interest in the nature of influence itself Part III explores the full range of Eliot s unpublished and published works chapters on each of the novels make a renewed case for the centrality of Eliot s works to current scholarly debates about nineteenth century literature other chapters offer ways into texts that have either been neglected such as the novellas and poetry or more often mined for biographical and historical contexts than given a close reading such as the notebooks manuscripts letters and journals Part IV gives close scrutiny to

those aspects of literary form which characterise Eliot's writing particularly her preoccupation with genre and her handling of voice both that of her narrators and her characters Part V assesses the complexity of Eliot's legacy for later writers concluding with five shorter essays which tackle the nature and impact of the enduring cultural status of Middlemarch as a often declared the great English novel

From Author to Text Caroline Levine, Mark W Turner, 2019-06-04 First published in 1998 this volume proposes to shift the critical emphasis from a canonical author to her uncanonical text from George Eliot to her novel *Romola* and contends that this choice both broadens the range of interpretive possibilities and brings them into sharper focus The editors invited a variety of critics to put their different critical models to work on *Romola* and the results are fertile and suggestive among the issues explored here are the domestic politics of marriage the relationship between narrative and epistemology the materiality of the text the novel's relation to nineteenth century narratives of martyrdom and the gendering of space Such theoretical eclecticism when focused on a common reference point necessarily opens out into a dialogue among critical and interpretive models Theory throws light onto *Romola* just as *Romola* throws light onto theory
